Many digital learning materials are also offered on the web:

- Academic Earth contains thousands of lectures from the world's top scholars.
- <u>Alison</u> is a free online education platform that mostly focuses on workplace-based skills. Alison's students have access to online courses, specializations, and degrees in a variety of subjects published by many big name universities and organizations.
- At <u>Big Think</u> you can watch videos from experts in a wide range of disciplines, from health to leadership and neuroscience.
- <u>CosmoLearning</u> is an educational website with <u>online colleges</u> and <u>documentaires</u>.
- <u>DWDD University</u> is an inquisitive branch of De Wereld Draait Door, which will be opened at irregular times to better understand the wonderful, spinning world.
- EUscreen contains television material from audiovisual archives from all over Europe.
- <u>Fastfacts</u> offers short videos about current developments in science. Because everything is published under the Creative Commons license, the videos can be shared with third parties without any problems.
- In <u>Free Documentaries</u> you will find documentaries such as: Supersize me or Bowling for Columbine. These are available for free.
- <u>The Futures Channel</u> is a producer and publisher of documentaries about careers and applications in science, technology, engineering and mathematics.
- <u>Khan Academy</u> is a 'not-for-profit' organization that offers educational videos for free (does not work under Internet Explorer).
- <u>Moving Image Archive</u> contains digital films uploaded by users that range from classic feature films, daily alternative news broadcasts, cartoons and concerts. Many of these videos are available as a free download.
- The <u>online lectures</u> of <u>Onlinecourses.com</u> cover a wide range of topics and have all been selected and carefully designed by experienced instructors around the world.
- <u>Planet SciCast</u> contains a large collection of scientific short videos, submitted by children, teachers, students and professionals.
- Qwiki is an encyclopedia about a variety of (scientific) topics aimed at an audio-visual presentation of the information.
- Sciencedump contains a collection of all kinds of short videos about science.
- Via <u>NPO Start</u>, the public broadcasters in the Netherlands together offer their recent TV broadcasts so that you can watch them 'on demand'.
- Teacher tube is a community where teachers can share instructional videos.
- <u>Videolectures.net</u> contains video lectures presented by scholars and scientists at events such as conferences, summer schools, workshops and science promotion events covering all areas of science.
